2010 Legislative Session Update #5

The Legislative Session that began on February 3, 2010, ended at midnight on Wednesday, May 5, 2010.

BUDGET:

The General Assembly passed a budget for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2011. Here are the highlights of its impact on the Judicial Branch:

- It provides adequate funding for our "other expenses" line item, which will allow us to keep the Bristol G.A. Courthouse open, as well as the Hartford, Bridgeport and Litchfield law libraries. In addition, we have asked the Department of Public Works to renegotiate the lease with the owner of the current Willimantic Juvenile Courthouse located at 81 Columbia Avenue. If that occurs, we plan to remain in the current facility, which will allow us to keep the Willimantic law library open. Unfortunately, the Milford and Norwich law libraries will remain closed and the Norwalk Juvenile Courthouse will close on July 1, 2010. The cases will be split between the Bridgeport Juvenile Court and the Stamford Juvenile Court.
- It provides \$1 million to fund an additional Judicial Marshal class.
- It provides funding for a criminal justice initiative designed to reduce the prison population.
- The budget also reforms the process by which the Judicial Branch's budget is adopted.
 - o It gives the Legislature the opportunity to see the Judicial Branch's budget recommendations, by requiring OPM to include the Judicial Branch's proposed budget in the Governor's budget.
 - o It also provides that OPM will allot to the Judicial Branch the exact amount of funding that is included in the approved state budget minus the specific amount of mandatory lapses included in the budget.
 - o Finally, it also gives the Legislature the opportunity to reject the cuts that are made by the Executive Branch to the Judicial Branch's budget after it is adopted.
- There are no changes to longevity payments, to the number of furlough days or to the occupational tax.

JUDGES' ELEVATIONS, APPOINTMENTS & REAPPOINTMENTS:

Elevations

Judge Dennis G. Eveleigh's nomination appointing him to the Supreme Court was approved on April 30, 2010. His appointment is effective on June 1, 2010.

Judge Stuart David Bear's nomination appointing him to the Appellate Court was approved on April 30, 2010, and he took the oath of office on that day.

JUDICIAL BRANCH BILLS

The Judicial Branch had two bills this legislative session; the legislature approved both.

The first bill, H.B. 5148, *An Act Concerning Funding for the Judicial Branch*, reformed the Judicial Branch's budget process and is summarized above.

H.B. 5539, *An Act Concerning Judicial Branch Powers and Procedures*. This bill provides many changes to statutes affecting the Judicial Branch. We have tried for three years to pass many of these provisions, and we are happy to report that the bill was approved unanimously in both chambers. Attached please find a summary of the bill.
